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Dealing with Incidences of School Violence*

When one thinks of school violence, often the first thing to come to mind is school shootings. Although events such as Newtown, Conn. are rare, some students face violence in school every day—ranging from bullying to rape to suicide and murder. Violence must never be tolerated.

Having effective prevention and response plans can be crucial in dealing with multiple forms of school violence. However, before being able to identify early warning signs, the school first must build the foundation and capacity to identify these signs. Schools need to create a caring school community where they have encouraging step-by-step reporting procedures, programs to continually train educators about warning signs, and policies that foster a partnership be-

tween the student's family and the school.

After creating a strong school foundation, what is most important in preventing and dealing with school violence is noticing student behavior problems, and recognizing those either at risk for committing violence or those who already are victims. *Safeguarding our Children: An Action Guide*, created by the U.S. departments of Justice and Education, is a guide for schools to understand the steps in using early intervention through five basic principles, including:

- Do no harm to the student:
- Understand violence and aggression within a context;
- Avoid stereotypes;
- View warning signs with a developmental context;
- Understand that children typically exhibit multiple warning signs.

Preventing violence in schools will improve a school's learning environment and create a safer community.

Resources

The departments of Education and Justice as well as the American Institutes for Research created a report called <u>Safeguarding Our Children: An Action Guide</u> to educate schools on how to prevent violence and deal with it when it occurs.

The <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention</u> is also a good resource to find data and statistics on school violence, prevention tools and additional resources.

The <u>National Parent Teacher Association (PTA)</u> provides resources for encouraging conversations about the prevention of bullying in school communities.

The <u>Center for Effective Collaboration and Practice</u> provides many resources related to school violence prevention and intervention.

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Simple Things You Can Do To Protect Yourself and Your Job

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- Make sure to read your district's computer usage policy.
- You may be allowed to use a district computer for personal use, but be careful!
- Emails may be subject to an Open Records request, even if they are not school-related.
- Never loan your district computer to anyone.
- Change your password frequently.
- Do not give your password to anyone.
- Always log off your computer when not in active use.
- Remember that even if you delete something, it may still be on the computer.
- If it has one, read your district's social media policy. Read it again.
- Make sure to check your privacy settings on all of your personal social media pages. Your default privacy settings should be set to "Friends."
- Don't friend students or their parents unless you have a page specifically for them. EVER.
- Ask your friends not to "tag" you in photos.
- Google yourself. If it's out there, a student will find it.
- Don't post photos of students online.
- Do not post any comment online that might make it possible to identify a student.
- Do not post comments about a student's health, whether positive or negative.
- Do not gripe online about students, parents, colleagues, supervisors or the district.

NOTE: social media can be dangerous, never "friend" students, parents, colleagues, or supervisors on your private page. This tends to blur the boundaries of professional versus private communications.
